Module 3 is to consider the way in which the healthcare systems in the UK responded to the Covid-19 pandemic. It will assess the impact the response on healthcare across the UK and what can be learned for the future. Module 3 will look at the impact on systems and includina services. patients, doctors, nurses, and other staff.
